Message from CEO

In addition Sandy and I were 'summonsed' to a meeting with Sir David Carter and Christine Quinn our new Regional Schools Commissioner at the Department for Education on Tuesday. A second meeting about school improvement was also arranged so that Brian Hooper who is now the Education Specialist with special responsibility for CAST schools could describe how he saw his role developing. In the event Louise Adams and Brian were able to join the meeting with Sir David which was helpful. Sir David started by explaining that he had asked Christine to take responsibility for us because Lisa Mannall, having worked for CAST, could be seen as having a conflict of interest. He then went on to make it very clear that we needed to make significant improvements within the next twelve months. I'm therefore very grateful to all of you (Headteachers & Chair of Governors) who have made such an effort to come to one or other of the meetings being held next week, where we shall have the opportunity to describe in more detail our next steps.

At a time when things are so hard it is lovely also to be able to report some good news - **St Mary's in Dorchester** has received a letter from Dorset Education Advisory Service who classified the school as Category 1 saying "Your school continues to perform consistently well and you deliver a high standard of education to your pupils." Well done to all concerned.

St Nicholas Catholic Primary School, Exeter

St Nicholas Catholic Primary School held a number of events in September to raise money for 3 cancer charities.

They held a Macmillan Coffee morning which was attended by parents and friends of the school and were pleased to raise over \pounds 130 from donations for cakes provided by staff and parents.

The whole school then took part in a Race for Life Event. We were blessed with a warm, sunny morning and all children, from Nursery to Yr 6 ran up to 4k. They were very excited to run the route together around the school grounds, supported by many parents cheering them on. They all received



a Race for Life medal and a cake once they had finished their race. We were delighted that our local Councillor came to support the event and hand out the medals alongside Fr Jonathan Stewart from Blessed Sacrament Church. From donations and sponsorship received to date we have raised over \pounds 2,000 which will be divided between Cancer Research UK, Clic Sargent and Macmillan. It was such a

St Mary's Catholic Primary School, Bodmin have been working with the TLAT group of schools to support more able disadvantaged pupils. Cathy Bresliin, year 4 teacher, took part in the project and her findings are summaries below:

Research Question: Does the implementation of cultural experiences through nurture sessions in key stage 2 have a positive impact on engagement and progress of more able disadvantaged pupils?

The problem that we needed to overcome was a lack of engagement and motivation within more able disadvantaged pupils during lessons and in their work. There were many barriers to learning which included behaviour, negative attitudes to school, low self-esteem, a lack of confidence in their abilities, lack of family engagement with learning and low aspirations.

We came up with a two-point strategy: 1) Increase engagement of pupils by broadening their Cultural Capitals through offsite visits and 2) Participate in collaborative learning with children who have different experiences than themselves.

We began with a 'Get to know you' session in the first week, with St Mary's going to Robartes. The children wanted to find out about Holy Wells in Bodmin. They planned each fortnightly trip, thinking about what they wanted to find out and linking their learning to many areas of the curriculum – history, maths, literacy, science and geography, with the children using the Holy Wells Guide, which was written by Bodmin Town Council, as a research tool.

We carried out surveys before the intervention about how the children felt about their learning experiences and this survey will be repeated at the end of the process. We are hoping that the children will not only make progress in their writing but that their attendance will increase as well as their attitude to learning and school.

The children were asked to present their findings about the Holy Well in a report that will be shared with the schools, parents and community, including Bodmin Town Council.

The children visited four of the Holy Wells around the Bodmin area

They measured the depth of the water and the flow of the water. They carried out observational drawings to show the different structure of each well. They used the Internet to research the history of each well including how and why they got their name.

Moving on with this project, the imminent future: Visiting Bodmin Town Museum to find out further information about the Holy Wells, Visit from the author of the Holy Wells trail and producing an information booklet to share with whole school, parents and community.

Further into the Future: Working in partnership with the National Trust to visit sites around Devon and Cornwall with the opportunity to participate in workshops to increase knowledge together with the opportunity to have a return pass so that children can visit again with their family.
